#### **Keynote Speakers**

#### Judith Jack Halberstam



Judith Jack Halberstam is Professor of English and Gender Studies at the University of Southern California. Halberstam works in the areas of popular, visual and queer culture with an emphasis on subcultures. Halberstam is the author of three books: *Skin Shows: Gothic Horror and the Technology of Monsters* (Duke University Press, 1995), *Female Masculinity* (Duke University Press, 1998) and *In a Queer Time and Place: Transgender Bodies, Subcultural Lives* (New York University Press, 2005). Halberstam was also the co–author with Del LaGrace Volcano of a photo/essay book, *The Drag King Book* (Serpent's Tail, 1999), and with Ira Livingston of an anthology, *Posthuman Bodies* (Indiana University Press, 1995).

Halberstam regularly speaks on visual culture and recently wrote catalogue essays for Austrian Inez Doujak, and Australian performance group, The Kingpins. At present Halberstam is finishing one book called *Notes on Failure* and beginning another on *Bats* for the acclaimed *Animal* series from Reaktion books.

**Alexis Wright** 



Alexis Wright is one of Australia's best known Indigenous authors and is a member of the Waanyi nation of the southern highlands of the Gulf of Carpentaria. A writer, researcher and social commentator, she has been widely published in magazines and journals. She has worked for many years on campaigns for Aboriginal land rights, Indigenous self–government and constitutional change in the Northern Territory, and for the prevention of Indigenous injury.

Her books include *Grog War* (Magabala Books, 1997, 2009), a study of the problems associated with the excessive availability of alcohol in the outback town of Tennant Creek, and she was the editor and compiler of *Take Power* (Jukurrpa Books, 1998), an anthology of essays and stories exploring Aboriginal land rights in Central Australia. Her novel *Plains of Promise* (University of Queensland Press, 1997) was short–listed for the Commonwealth Prize, The Age Book of the Year Award, and the NSW Premier's Award for Fiction.

Her novel *Carpentaria* (Giramondo, 2006; Constable and Robinson, 2008 and; Atria, 2009) won the 2007 Miles Franklin Literary Award, the Australian Literature Society Gold Medal, the Victorian Premier's Award for Fiction, the Queensland Premier's Award for Fiction, and the ABIA Literary Fiction Book of the Year.

Alexis also holds the position of Distinguished Research Fellow at the University of Western Sydney, Writing and Society Research Group, College of the Arts.



#### **David M Berry**



Dr David Berry is a Lecturer in Media Studies in the Department of Political and Cultural Studies at Swansea University. His research is particularly focused on theories of digital code/software and data visualisation.

David is a member of Swansea's Centre for Study of Politics and Culture (C–SCAP) and has published widely on technology, media, and politics; more recently a monograph on free culture entitled *Copy, Rip, Burn: The Politics of Copyleft and Open Source* (Pluto Press, 2008) and, *Software Studies: Understanding Code and Software in the Digital Economy* (forthcoming from Palgrave).

#### Arzoo Osanloo



Dr Arzoo Osanloo is an Associate Professor at the University of Washington's Department of Anthropology and the Law, Societies and Justice Program.

Formerly an immigration and asylum/refugee attorney, Arzoo conducts research and teaches courses focusing on the intersection of law and culture, including human rights, refugee rights and identity, and women's rights in Muslim societies. Her geographical focus is on the Middle East, especially Iran.

Arzoo has published in various journals, including *American Ethnologist*, *Cultural Anthropology* and *Iranian Studies*. Her book, *The Politics of Women's Rights in Iran* (2009), is published by Princeton University Press.

She is currently working on a new project that considers the Islamic mandate of forgiveness, compassion, and mercy in Iran's criminal sanctioning system, jurisprudential scholarship and everyday acts among pious Muslims.

#### **Timothy Campbell**



Dr Timothy Campbell is an Associate Professor of Italian in the Department of Romance Studies at Cornell University, New York.

Timothy is the translator of Roberto Esposito's *Bios: Biopolitics* and *Philosophy* (University of Minnesota Press, 2008) and the recently released *Communitas: The Origin of Destiny of Community* (Stanford University Press, 2009).

Dr Campbell is the author of *Wireless Writing in the Age of Marconi* (University of Minnesota Press, 2006) and *Improper Life: Technology and Biopolitics from Heidegger to Agamben* (Guerini, 2009) as well as the co–editor with Adam Sitze of *Biopolitics: A Reader* which is forthcoming from Duke.

His current project is a study of the figure of grace and exception in the cinema of Rossellini and Antonini.



#### Karen Jackson



Karen Jackson is a Yorta Yorta, Barap Barap woman who is strongly committed to Indigenous issues, particularly in Victoria. She is the Indigenous Services Programs Officer at Victoria University of Technology.

Karen has spent most of her working life with government agencies. Her work has involved working directly with Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander individuals, families and community organisations and developing inter–departmental and cross–sectoral policy and programs that are culturally appropriate and inclusive of Indigenous values.

Karen is a firm believer in the ideals of self-determination and self-management for Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander people. She is also fully committed to the ongoing struggle for recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage and rights to land and to the process of reconciliation.

#### **Mark Minchinton**



Professor of Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander Studies in the Design and Social Context Office at the School of Art, RMIT, Melbourne, Mark has been a writer, dancer, script editor and performer in classical and contemporary mainstream plays, sound art, improvised cabaret and performance art productions.

Following the start of a professional career as a member of the Australian Performing Group at the Pram Factory, Mark has made collaborative works for the Malthouse, Australian Centre for Contemporary Arts, Spoleto Festival, Greenmill Dance Festival, Performance Space and the Melbourne International Comedy Festival.

Born by his own description, "white—skinned", in the Otways of Victoria, Mark undertook in 2003 a web writing/walking performance and installation through parts of Western Australia for the National Review of Live Arts, Midland, exploring his Indigenous (Wardandi) ancestry.

Mark is previously an Associate Professor in Performance Studies at Victoria University, Melbourne and Artist in Residence at Edith Cowan University.



#### **Keynote Abstracts**

#### Judith Jack Halberstam

(9.00 – 10.15 am, 2 December, DELL Gallery S05, Lecture Theatre, Room 2.04)

Title: "Unbecoming"

Abstract: In this talk I present a piece of a book I am finishing that is tentatively titled "Notes on Failure" and that concerns itself with a contemporary politics of knowledge the possibly counter-intuitive forms of knowing that might be necessary now in order to unseat logics of power and being that have proven to be dead ends for thinking through social change. I look at failure and passivity as forms of resistance and I track the force of what I call a "queer negativity" through art work preoccupied with unbecoming, unbeing, sterility and futility much of which is figured as the unravelling of self in literary works and the gaping presence of empty space in visual works. Building here on the work of feminists like Saidiya Hartman and Saba Mahmood and locating a queer femininity that refuses resistance and reshapes the meaning of the political in the process, I want to offer up a queer theory of masochism and negative affect that revels in failures, builds around an anti-heroic, disintegrating subject and in the process recasts the project of thinking sex and gender.

Title: "On Vicarious Transformations"

Abstract: A talk exploring the computational image

Philosophers of science, especially Wilfred Sellars, have contrasted what they term the "manifest" image and the "scientific" image. The former refers to the image of the world we develop on the basis of reflecting upon our ordinary experience of it; the latter to the quite different and often counter-intuitive image of the world created by science and which often refers to things we cannot directly perceive. In this presentation I consider a third case: the computational image. This is different to computationalism, the argument that the human mind can be characterised as like a computer', and also to the argument that an increasing portion of the human and social world is explainable through computational processes. Rather I want to consider the historical emergence of computability as an explanatory framework for understanding being, evolution or life and of conceiving of the universe as software running on the "Universal Computer" we call reality.



#### **Arzoo Osanloo**

Title: "Advocacy in Post-Republican Iran: Or, how Iran's Newly Authoritarian Regime Engenders a New Politics Of Rights Talk"

Abstract: In the aftermath of Iran's June 12<sup>th</sup> elections, a seemingly relentless mobilisation of dissenters have shaped and sustained a new social and political movement that challenges the legitimacy of the current Iranian government. Members of the newly formed Green Movement for Freedom refer to the sitting Iranian government as the 'coup d'état government,' while commentators from both inside and outside of the country increasingly refer to Iran's government as authoritarian, dictatorial, even fascistic. The world's press has scrupulously covered and praised the efforts of the Iranians who challenge the government's legitimacy, calling the protestors brave and courageous.

The current Iranian government, however, is far from the only authoritarian regime in the Middle East or for that matter the world. So why is it that we see this scale of dissent and protest in Iran, while not in other authoritarian countries, where we also see rigged elections, such as in Egypt? Moving beyond laudatory ascriptions of the bravery of the Iranian people, this talk will consider the institutions and subjectivities engendered through a century-long struggle for a constitutional government, resistance to imperialist intervention and most importantly, the consequences of the 'republicanisation' of Islamic principles in the post-revolutionary era.

This talk will tie together current calls for rights with the often overlooked aspects and effects of the Iranian government's 'republic,' noting that up to now, Khomeini's vision for a so-called 'pure' Islamic Government has been overshadowed by the compromise formation of an Islamic *Republic*.

This talk will explore today's struggles in Iran as a contest over the form of governance still taking shape in Iran today – thirty years on.

#### **Timothy Campbell**

Title: "Liminal Personae: The Thanatopolitics of Personalisation in the Neo-Liberal Milieu"

Abstract: What is the function of the person today in a context of neo-liberal governance? In this paper I offer a provisional answer by examining how the recent, massive personalisation of life forms, be they collective or individual, is integral to the workings of neo-liberalism. After offering a symptomology of this personalizing trend with dispatches from the front-lines of neo-liberalism, I turn to contemporary Italian thought, especially the work of Giorgio Agamben and Roberto Esposito, in order to link neo-liberal personalisation strategies to an intensifying thanatopolitics, that is a deathly mastery over life as Michel Foucault called it. I conclude by inquiring after possible practices of resistance, particularly through the admittedly problematic category of the impersonal.
